The Clientele Invite Participation and are not surprised to meet Colombians, Iranians, Peruvians, Ceylonese, Indians or Pakistanis, even if Citizens, Inhabitants or Plain Americans would seem a more obvious choice.

Another area for Comment, Insertion, and Primary thanks must go to the host families who provide Care, Investment and Pleasure to the hoards. Clever, Indiscriminate and Personalized supervisors offer Close, Innate Perusal of the flock with Carefully Inspired Precision. Supervisors and families make the guests feel Comfortable Initiated and Pleasant among other things.

Cooperation, Interchange and Practise are the major Considerations, Ideologies and Policies of the Council for International Programmes. Congratulations, Incantations and Philcitations on the 25th Birthday, not forgetting the bi-Centenary Inevitable Pleasantries of the past 200 years.

For all this we are grateful - it only remains for me now to say - Go Forth, Ollendorff! Continue, Instruct and Persevere."

The definition above was probably penned on the occasion of the 25th Birthday of CIP, but perhaps still holds good over a quarter century later.

We all look forward to the CIF International conference in Cleveland, Ohio, the city where it all started. It's like homecoming. Here's wishing the CIPUSA organizers all the best. I know what a lot of work and effort goes to make any conference a success, having gone through with it for the Goa conference not so long ago.

## COUNCIL OF INTERNATIONAL FELLOWSHIP

### Minutes of the General Assembly Bonn

Germany

July 2005

195 CIF International members attended the General Assembly held in Bonn, Germany on 29th July 2005.

Ms. Lambrini-Ninetta Zoi, President CIF International opened the meeting and welcomed the members. She gave an overview of main activities from August 2003 to July 2005. She informed that the EC met 4 times in this period. The old EC met the new EC for handing and taking over in London, UK in August 2003, followed by Kassel, Germany in November 2003, then in Riga, Latvia, in July 2004 and last in Vienna, Austria in Feb 2005.

She informed the General Assembly of the framework of the 26th CIF International Conference and expressed her deep appreciation for all the good work that CIF Germany has put into organizing this excellent Conference in Bonn!

The President was proud to inform that there were 27 CIF branches all over the world. Ms. Lambrini Zoi informed that the 28th CIF Branch would be CIF Aotearoa (New Zealand and Australia)

Ms. Lambrini Zoi informed that she was happy to see CIF Sweden and CIF Finland supporting Branches in the Baltic countries. She also informed that they are supporting CIF members in Ghana and in Kyrgyzstan in forming Branches. CIF Sweden visited Ghana last year and is planning to visit Kyrgyzstan next year.

#### **Report of Board of Directors Meeting**

The Board of Directors met on 2nd, 3rd and 4th July 2004 and also on 29th July in Riga, Latvia. The BD had also met during the conference in Bonn,

Germany on the 23rd, 24th, and 25th July 2005. Ms. Lambrini Zoi briefed the assembly on the strategic planning meetings of the board of directors during these two BD meetings.

### **Report on Strategic Planning process:**

Ms. Lambrini Zoi thanked Dorothy Faller who had accepted the invitation to come to the BD meeting and voluntarily continue with the Strategic Planning Process as started in Goa and continued in Riga.

After deliberations and hard work the following decisions were made:

1. **The mission statement was adopted. It is:**

**The Council of International Fellowship provides professional human services development and training through intercultural exchange."**

2. Include ISP members to be CIF members.
3. Last two editions of World News will be available to everyone on the web.
4. To link the International Federation of Social Workers web site to the Council of International Fellowship. EC will examine further linking of CIF International website and websites of other organizations.
5. All e-mails to EC should be copied to the secretary.
6. E-mails from EC to the branches will be responded to in 14 days.
7. Communications: Embrace new technologies. Not impossible for any Branch, but Ghana cannot do teleconferencing and only two cities are on line.
8. CIF International will be ready with new communication methods by 6 months.
9. Governance: Look at alternative ways for administrative support: hiring for services; paying expenses.
10. Be inclusive in relation to costs, specifically.
11. EC will do a new transition process, but not lengthen terms at this time.
12. Set up working Committees for:
  - Finance Advisory
  - Fundraising
  - Marketing (Shirley Worland (Australia) will share the Brochure she did for Australia with this Committee).
13. Set up a method for standardization to put goals in place at the Branch and CIF level, including the Exchange Programmes Curriculum.
14. EC will provide certificates from CIF International that Branches are

approved and their Exchange Programme as well.

#### 15. Volunteers to write the Strategic Plan.

Ms. Lambrini Zoi informed that CIF France would host the next BD Meeting in Paris in September/October 2006 as CIF France would be celebrating its 40th anniversary. We have accepted the proposal asking them to keep the costs as low as possible.

Ms. Lambrini Zoi informed that the next conference would be in Cleveland, USA. The theme would be "Bridges for the future". Update information would be available in the January 2006 edition of the World News.

#### **Report of the Editor of CIF World News:**

Ms. Nüket Atalay, informed that the World News was published in July 2003, January 2004 and Jan 2005 and distributed to all the National Branches, CPs and individual CIF International members regularly.

The experiment of putting the WN on the CIF Sweden web site was quite successful and she said that it has been put up on the CIF International site as well on experimental basis.

She informed that old issues of the WN were put on a floppy disk by Mr. Raul Kivi (CIF Estonia) and were available

#### **Report on CIF International Web Site:**

Mr. Leo Heikkila informed that the web site has been updated regularly and that it was further improved in July 2005. A live demonstration was given to the members.

He also said that links to various NBs who had a web site would be made available on one click.

The members were informed that he is supported sporadically by volunteers in his present work.

The CIF International web site had the last two issues of the WN. It was decided to have the file of all the old WN created by Mr Raul Kivi of CIF Estonia accessible with a password and the latest versions without a password.

#### **Report of the Contact Persons Coordinator:**

Mr. Leo Heikkila, reported that he had done a survey in 2004 August: e-mails and / letters were sent to 34 CPs and only 13 CPs reacted!

The CP List has been updated according to the survey.

Mr. Leo Heikkila, informed that there were CP challenges for 2005-2007.

Priority was to first get candidates in countries where there was a potential,

theoretically the larger number of former CIF program participants the better. For example: Europe: Poland, former Balkan Countries. In Africa: Morocco, Egypt, And South Africa, In Asia: Bangladesh, Thailand and Philippines

#### **Report of the Exchanges Programmes Coordinator:**

Ms. Nadine Rogue informed that the guidelines on CIF Exchange Program was revised in December 2004 and distributed to all the NBs.

The Final Evaluation Report was sent to all the NBs.

Ms. Nadine Rogue, informed that with the help of Marie Therese Martin of CIF France, she had completed the CIF participants directory up to 2004. She informed that the file was in word format and could be merged with the CIP directory if it could be put on the Access document.

Ms. Nadine Rogue, informed that the Baltic countries had their first EP in May/June of 2005. The first EP program of Aotearoa/New Zealand and Australia would be taking place in September 2005. CIF Cameroon and CIF Switzerland were planning to have their first EP in 2006. CIF Argentina is planning to have an EP in 2007. CIF Kenya and CIF Tanzania haven't yet informed of any EP in 2005-2006.

#### **Report of Treasurer:**

The treasurer, Ms. Mieke Weeda presented the assembly with the report. She informed that Mr. Hakan Berggren had completed the accounts up to 2004. She informed that the 2000-2004 accounts (profit and loss statement) were now tabulated.

Ms. Mieke Weeda, said that there is now a 2 year budget, ending with the conference year. Therefore the new budget for the years 2006-2007 was presented. Budgets need to be realistic and that means based on the realistic expectations of the income. The 06/07 budget has now been increased to make it more realistic. The Budget for 2006-2007 was unanimously passed.

Ms. Mieke Weeda informed that this year 11 participants were given grants to attend the conference. 8 of them were also given grant towards their travel costs.

#### **Secretary's report:**

Ms. Zarin Gupta presented the amendment to paragraph 5 of the Statutes as required by the Court in Bonn, Germany. At the BD meeting in Bonn, Ms. Lambrini Zoi suggested that since the amendment of paragraph 5 is being done it would be the right time to include in CIF membership, members of ISP program (International Study program of the Federal Republic of Germany). All the BD members unanimously had agreed to the inclusion. The amendment is

now presented for voting to the General Assembly. All 195 members presented voted for the amendment. It now states "Article 5 - MEMBERSHIP

Membership of the Organization will be open to all former participants in CIF and CIP (Cleveland International Program - Council of International Programs) Exchange Programs, former participants of CIPUSA Exchange Programs and International Study Program (ISP) of the Federal Republic of Germany who are social workers, special educators, youth leaders and others in closely related professions, and individuals who support the objectives of CIF.

Eligible persons may acquire membership by written request and payment of membership to the National Branch; in countries where no National Branch exists, requests may be made directly to the CIF President and the decision will be at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

Membership is terminated by non-payment of fees, by death, by voluntary resignation from the Organization and by expulsion from membership by the Board of Directors. If the membership fees are not paid, the member will be reminded in writing and a final date will be set for payment. If payment is not received by set date the member will be excluded. The resignation has to be submitted in writing to the respective National Branch. Where no National Branch exists, the declaration of resignation has to be sent to the CIF International President or CIF International Secretary. The Board of Directors retains the authority to terminate membership for actions inappropriate to the spirit of CIF. A member whose membership has been terminated in this way may appeal to the General Assembly who can reverse such a decision with a 2/3 (two-thirds) majority of those present.

Ms. Lambrini Zoi also suggested that we could work on future cooperation with AGJ (Arbeitsgemeinschaft für Jugendhilfe).

#### **Report from CIPUSA:**

Ms. Lisa Purdy (President & Chief Executive Officer - CIPUSA) shared information about CIPUSA.

CIPUSA is a program conducted from 1 to 18 months in the USA. She informed that CIPUSA at present have 9 CIPUSA affiliates in the country. They are Chicago- Illinois, Cleveland-Ohio, Columbus-Ohio, Denver-Colorado, Kalamazoo-Michigan, Morgantown-West Virginia, San Diego-California, San Francisco-California, and Scranton-Pennsylvania.

'The Olive branch' CIPUSA Newsletter, is read on the website. CIPUSA has developed a data base with 10,000 members.

She informed the board members that CIPUSA would host the next CIF International Conference in 2007, in Cleveland, Ohio. She said that she would be working closely with CIF USA and CIPUSA affiliates for the conference. She would however send details to be printed in the January 2006 issue of the World News.

### **Results of Elections:**

Ms. Gunvor Bretschneider chairperson of the Election Committee announced the result of the elections for the following posts:

President: Ms. Lambrini (Ninetta) Zoi.

Vice-President: Ms. Zarin Gupta.

Treasurer: Ms. Birgitta Holm.

Members-at-Large: Mr. Leo Heikkila,

### **Any Other Business:**

Ms. Inge Bierbrauer (CIF Germany) informed that the official opening of a square with Henry Ollendorff's name has been planned for the Monday after the conference and invited all the members. The city council of Darmstadt (Henry Ollendorff's hometown) decided to do so -Martha, Frank and Jane would be attending it.

Ms. Mireille Boucher (CIF France) announced that September-October 2006 would be the 40th anniversary celebration of CIF France. She proposed that the next BD meeting after the BD meeting in Bonn could be held in France. She said that they would plan exhibitions, cultural activities.

Ms. Lambrini Zoi (President, CIF International) thanked all the members.

## REPORT OF CIF BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

**Invited Guest:** Dorothy Faller, former CEO of CIPUSA, in charge of the Strategic Planning Process voluntarily.

The President, Lambrini-Ninetta Zoi, opened the meeting and welcomed the members present. She thanked Mireille Boucher, President of CIF France, and all the other French members for the invitation to their 40th Branch Anniversary and for hosting the BD meeting.

As an introduction to the meeting she showed a short and interesting power point presentation on techniques for better intercultural communication and then asked all participants to present themselves and to let us know their name, their Branch, the CIF/CIP/CIPUSA Exchange Programs they attended and a favourable experience they had made.

All 18 NBs and CIPUSA present fulfilled the requirements for voting rights and newcomers were welcomed.

The minutes of the last meeting in July 2005 in Bonn/Germany was approved unanimously as well as the agenda for this meeting.

Lambrini-Ninetta presented an overview of the 28 National Branches (NBs) and their activities. She stated, unfortunately, she has not received all Annual Activity Reports (AARs) from the 28 NBs so far. In some cases not only reports from 2005 but also from 2004 are still missing. Furthermore,

she stated that the Final Evaluation Reports (FERs) are a tool to analyse the whole planning and implementation of each EP run by the NBs and in addition they are providing information on applicants, selected applicants and the participants which are needed in order to update the directory on a regular basis. However, this requirement has not been fulfilled either by a number of NBs. She regrets this as well as that several questions were not answered in a proper way. These reports that were revised repeatedly by the EC are our major tools for regular communication between the NBs, the EC and amongst the members of the Board of Directors (BD).

23 NBs have an Exchange Program and 11 NBs have now a Home Page.

**New Branches:** Recently, Aotearoa/New Zealand and Australia decided to form two Branches from now on as now they have a sufficient number of alumni. The presidents are Sarah DeSouza and Pepple Shih. Both countries decided to have the Exchange Programs in 2007 as planned.

Kyrgyzstan founded a Branch only a few months ago. Gulasel Nogoibaeva who attended the Conference in Bonn is the President and they have submitted to the EC all the relevant documents.

Cyprus is working on the foundation of a Branch. Maria Christopoulou has been in contact with more than 20 CIP alumni, their statutes are ready and under the legal process for authorization.

The Board approved the above-mentioned new Branches and in total we have presently 31 NBs.

The treasurer, Birgitta Holm, presented her report. The profit and Loss Statement as well as the Balance Sheet for 2006 were given to all persons present. She talked about the Income, the Expenses, the costs for EC and BD meetings and the existing funds which are the HBO and Martha Ollendorff Fund, the Sonja and Paul Unger Fund and the CIF Finland/Sweden Fund.

With regard to bank transactions it was stated that Håkan Berggren, Co-Treasurer of CIF International, has advised to encourage more bank transactions: in particular from the Western countries. Payments of fees and grants should preferably be made through bank transfer. Birgitta strongly requested that all NBs who can handle it this way should do so in the future.

Another point were the grants for the next conference. Birgitta should be informed by the NBs before 31 December, 2006 which decisions were taken related to grants. Of course, all funds, given at any time, will be accepted.

As the expenses augment from year to year we need to increase our income. There are different ways to do this: to increase the number of paying members, to raise the membership fee which was already discussed at the conference in Bonn or to find other sources, e. g. donators, etc.

Zarin Gupta, the Vice President, stated that she is the editor of the WN since the end of July 2005. She is always open for suggestions and recommendations. She asks for understanding that she has to shorten articles sometimes which always depends on how much space she has available. Zarin referred also to the e-version of the WN and suggested to check with the members if they would like to download it themselves as then less hard copies would be needed. This would save costs. Furthermore, Zarin stated that a lot of work is involved in publishing the WN every 6 months.

Leo Heikkilä, member at large and the Contact Persons' Coordinator and Webmaster, reported regarding the website of CIF International. The version which was accepted in Bonn is still valid. However, he is working on a new format and he plans to simplify pages and updates. He welcomes new websites from NBs and pointed out that it is of major importance to update the websites on a regular basis. Leo also indicated that the two last versions of the WN are in the web and could be downloaded by the CIF members themselves. With regard to the new CIF International Brochure he stated that it would be available most probably until the end of the year.

Leo stated that we have right now 16 Contact Persons (CPs). The new CPs are from Romania, Serbia, Philippines and Russia (St. Petersburg). CPs recruitment, encouragement, guidance and supervision is an ongoing process and he welcomes any possible help for this from BD members in suggesting alumni who would be ready to become a Contact Person, etc.

Maria Hierlinger-Gudat, the secretary, reported about the changes of § 5 membership of the International Statutes and updates regarding the following guidelines: "Guidelines for Conference Grants", "Application Form for Grants for the CIF International Conference in ..." and the "Guidelines for proposing and Organizing a CIF Conference." With regard to the last mentioned guideline the members stated that it does not contain sufficient information for the country that has to organize a conference. It should provide much more detailed information like a manual. Therefore, the BD decided to form a working group with the following members: Maria Stefani, Zarin Gupta, Ilse Hoffmann and Lisa Purdy. This task should be finished by the end of February 2007.

Nadine Rogue, member at large and the Exchange Programs Coordinator, reported that the Final Evaluation Report (FER) provides a good overview. She regrets that not all NBs sent the requested FER to her. Furthermore, she pointed out that the list of the participants is needed every year for the Directory. She recommended to convert the existing Directory (word document) into an excel program which, however, is a very time consuming task. Therefore, volunteers are needed for this job. It would be desirable to have the new Directory ready for the Cleveland Conference in July 2007. Gabi Kronberger offered her assistance.

Lisa Purdy, from CIPUSA mentioned that 2006 was a very busy year for CIPUSA. Some new Programs were offered and two projects are still going on with Turkey (Nuket Atalay) and Ethiopia (Dorothy Faller) - helping the School of Social Work to implement the first Master level. There are also smaller projects going on e. g. with Turkey (Nuket) and Italy (Mimmo Merola). Lisa pointed out that these projects are really a very good experience.

Lisa presented the conference update and mentioned that they have a very good team which meets every week. Dorothy is a big support because of her very long experience with CIF. The Conference site, the Case Western Reserve University, is a gorgeous place with new buildings and dormitory style rooms. She gave also an overview on the conference days and program. All of us got the impression that a great conference will wait for us in Cleveland in July 2007.

Michael Cronin, president of CIF USA, gave a very interesting power point presentation on the CIF Social Work Experience - Purpose and Scope of Social Work. He showed in an excellent illustrative way that in CIF we have internal resources we often do not use. His presentation was based on his dissertation - he made his Doctor of Philosophy in Social Welfare in May 2005. He has the intention to write an article about his findings and conclusions and to have it translated into different languages.

Branches projects involving specialized Exchange Programs were presented and briefly discussed:

1. Veta Bakagianni reported that CIF Hellas accepting the proposal of Dr. Munira Merchant, former Vice President and Webmaster of CIF International, hosted in Athens, Greece a group of 11 social work students accompanied by two professors - one of them Munira, in May 2005. This was a 10 days 3-credit study abroad course for BSW and MSW students titled "International Social Work Practice",

organized by CIF Hellas in partnership with Aurora University-George Williams College of Health and Human Services. The course consisted of lectures and visits to Social Service Agencies aiming to develop the students' knowledge of the Greek social welfare system and in turn, deepen their understanding of the US system. The participants left with very positive typical CIF comments: "It changed my life!" CIF Hellas running this program managed to get donations not only from its members but also from many more individuals (e. g. lecturers) and organizations (e. g. field visits), and therefore gained a profit. Veta stated that Munira has the intention to come again with a new group. She feels that such projects and experiences besides operating as funds generator make a Branch more alive and known. For example the US Embassy was invited and present for meetings.

2. Turkey reported about the Community Leadership Project in which CIF Turkey is involved to a certain extent. They did not make any money. If money is left over it should be, of course, for the use of the Branch.
3. Mireille Boucher and Lambrini-Ninetta referred to the European Leonardo Project and their cooperation with the University of Maribor (Slovenia) Project Coordinator with Project Partners GRETA (adult education body) and CIF France and CIF Hellas (Greece). The project started in 2005 and will be completed in 2007 and its title is: "Parents training most powerful supporters and guiders of persons with disabilities."

This is one of the very first experiences of CIF participating in the implementation of European Union Projects and it is certainly an experimental learning including difficulties for the Branches involved. Mireille emphasized that it is a hard job and she does the necessary work mostly in the evening. It is hoped that the Branches will also have some improvement in their overall financial situation at the end.

### **Strategic Planning Process (SPP)**

Dorothy Faller continued her work on the SPP. She reminded that the discussion for changing the direction of CIF should go on so that it does not disappear but adjust smoothly to the changing world of today. It started after an unanimously decision in Athens (2002) and its enthusiastic implementation in Goa (2003) and was continued in Riga (2004), in Bonn 2005 and now in Paris. We need to think about changes in a positive way.

Lambrini-Ninetta reported that the work and time involved in this process is much more and could not be anticipated at the beginning. The times between the BD meetings have proved not to be very productive but with the constant support and systematic preparation and continuity by Dorothy the SPP is progressing in a satisfactory way. She expressed to Dorothy in the name also of the EC and BD members the deep appreciation for her significant help offered to CIF voluntarily. The discussions were only able to cover one aspect of the SPP namely governance.

Lambrini-Ninetta explained that the amount of work needed to keep the organization alive and growing requires changes in our governance structure. The exchange of e- and webmails around the world is overwhelming. The Executive Committee (EC) alone can no longer carry the full burden.

The results of the two half days of discussions under Dorothy's coordination were: There is a great need to establish an office with a paid staff for CIF by 2009.

**Decision 1:** To hire a paid staff member to support the CIF International and the Executive Committee provided adequate plan and funding is obtained and agreed upon.

**Decision 2:** To increase the CIF Conference fee to CIF International from 5 to 20 Euro in 2009. CIPUSA promised to examine the possibility to increase the 5 Euro fee according to capacity at the end of the Cleveland conference.

**Decision 3:** Write a grant proposal to provide start up money for the first three years. The Executive Committee will do this with the help of a working group consistent of Lisa Purdy, Dorothy Faller, Inge Bierbrauer and Michael Cronin. This will be completed by the end of February 2007 for the next EC meeting. The draft will be sent to the National Branches (NBs).

NBs will send information of two or more possible foundations to the Executive Committee. The name of the foundation, the guidelines, and the deadlines for submission are needed. The personal contacts are also needed.

**Decision 4:** National Branches will maintain their core programs with the option to expand to other programs (e. g. for students) and to make our programs compatible (aligned) for university credit, for continuing education credit, and to inform the EC of CIF accrediting requirements (licensing, registration, certification) for social workers and related professionals.

Information for this will be gathered from the International Associations of Schools of Social Work, and the requirements of the Council on Social

Work Education and other appropriate bodies.

**Decision 5:** Letters are in progress to link websites with IFSW, IASSW, ICSW and ICSD.

**Decision 6:** Explore the options to work toward one video conference or telephone conference every 6 months if needed, and to use home based telecommunication of the Board of Directors of CIF.”

Finally, the Executive Committee reminded the Branches that it looks forward to receiving proposals which country would be ready to host the conference in 2009 and the Board of Directors Meeting in 2008.

Lambrini-Ninetta thanked all members present for their good cooperation and fruitful discussions.

Almost everybody who attended the BD meeting stayed for the celebration of the 40th birthday of CIF France which was a pleasant and interesting event.



## CIF - Sweden in Kyrgyzstan in August 2006

Gulayim Ismailova, a former participant of the Swedish program, had invited the Swedish branch to visit her country. To

some of us the idea seemed a bit unreal but very interesting. More than 30 persons expressed interest and curiosity – and 17 persons went.

One day during the winter Gulayim turned up in Stockholm and presented the schedule.

One of the first days in August we were all together in a children’s home in Bishkek, the capital of Kyrgyzstan. A very generous arrangement! The children were on holiday - which made it possible for us to stay there. We were

very comfortable there. Several times during our tour we were impressed by the hospitality we met.

Kyrgyzstan is covered up to 93% with mountains - most of them higher than 5000 meters. The capital Bishkek is surrounded of a ring of mountains - some of them wearing caps of snow - while the temperature on the ground was over 30 degrees C. Wherever we travelled in the country we enjoyed so beautiful and dramatic sceneries.

In Bishkek we visited a school equipped and sponsored by Unicef. School in Kyrgyzstan is compulsory but still many parents do not send their children there. The general economy of the families is very poor. Therefore also the children's contributions to the family's living are needed. This school has succeeded in getting more pupils since the children were offered breakfast and lunch paid by Unicef and Save the Children in Denmark.

We also visited an institution for left children. From this home several children had been adopted both in Kyrgyzstan and abroad. Here the children could stay to an age of four. After that they must go to an other institution for older children. The matron who wanted "her" children to stay did not approve this rule.

It was very hot in Bishkek those days. Because of the temperature Gulayim switched our schedule from one day to another. We left Bishkek and went to the resort at the beautiful lake of Issyk-Kul. Here we spent four comfortable and lazy days while Gulayim was away working. Before she left she hold a lecture on "Kyrgyzstan today" which was very appreciated of our group. One day we were offered a national drink - Kymus (local name). It is fermented horse milk. - To be honest - not all of us appreciated this speciality! We travelled in minibuses - often on miserable ways and occasionally where roads were missing. During two days we had four flat tyres. Our two drivers seemed to be used to those events and we were most of the time patiently waiting during the repairs. Next place for stop overnight was Barskoon - where we stayed in a private home. This family intended to live on tourism and was so hospitable. They moved out of their rooms to give us space. We saw different examples of handicraft - most of the things were made from sheep's wool. We visited a co-operative of women who made woollen carpets in bright colours.

Our last stay in the countryside was a farm where they have lots of horses. We were free to ride and the five bravest in our group did. The farmers here had started two years ago to earn their living buy accepting tourists at the farm. They had two yurtas - the old type of mobile home used by nomadic

people. There we slept for two nights enjoying looking through the big hole in the top of the roof - a marvellous starry sky. Some from the group stayed an extra day at this farm.

On the way back to Bishkek we visited relatives of Gulayim who were cultivating strawberries and we were invited to pick and taste.

The last days together we spent in the same institution for homeless children where we started. We had a rather busy time to see as much as possible in Bishkek.

The stay in Bishkek ended with a huge party - celebrating both Gulayim's birthday and the beginning of a CIF branch in this country. We met a group with very enthusiastic CIF-members, who had been participating in CIF-programs in Europe during the last few years.

During this night some of the most enthusiastic Kyrgyz and some Swedes had a meeting dealing with establishing a branch, which they already had prepared and it was formed this night. The new branch also got a starting grant, since the treasurer of CIF International happened to be a participant of our travelling group. We felt the same kind of enthusiasm as we did with the Baltic countries earlier. We also met with Gulasel Nogoibaeva, who participated at the conference in Bonn. It was such a joy to meet the Kyrgyz members and this meeting was sure one of the highlights of our trip.

Gulasel also arranged a visit to a hospital the following day and some visits to handicraft shops.

We are all very happy for our very successful and eventful journey.

## Memories from CIF Italia Program 2006

So many nice persons, such good food and a lot of interesting experiences! I was in Italy for almost a month in September/October 2006 and I will never forget it. We were only two in the CIF Italy Program, my colleague Anni from Finland and me from Sweden. I have been to Italy many times before but my reason of going there this time to the CIF program was to get to know how my job as a social

worker is in Italy.

We got the theoretical part of the program, how the health, education and social system is built in Italy, during our first week, in S. Maria Capua Vetere. Those lectures that we got were really interesting and valuable. S. Maria Capua Vetere is a small town outside Naples, situated in the South of Italy. It is nothing really special at the first sight. A lot of traffic and lot of rubbish (a big problem in the South of Italy, 'where to throw away all the rubbish?'). But after a while you just love the place and especially the people. S. Maria Capua Vetere also has a very interesting amphitheatre which is almost abandoned and I really hope that somebody soon will take care of it. It's an historical jewel and nobody seems to care about it!

My first week in Southern Italy was very special for me, as a Swedish person. It's very common in these parts of Italy to go out and have pizza around 10 at night and the restaurants are always crowded even during the weekdays. In this part of Italy you easily make many friends and therefore my group of friends grew larger and larger each day ...from the first day until the last.

A young psychologist whom we had met along with her colleagues took

us out on an excursion in the first week.. They took us out into the countryside with all their clients. This psychologist works with clients with really difficult psychiatric illnesses like schizophrenia and psychosis. Once a month they take these clients from the clinic to do something nice. In September, when I was there, they took all the patients to a summer-cottage owned by the church. We spent a really nice day eating, singing and dancing with all these people and during that day it was sometimes difficult to find out who was a client and who was staff. It was a bit like in the film with Jack Nicolson "One flew over the cuckoos nest" when Jack Nicolson presents all the patients as doctors when they are boarding a boat. The psychiatrist (the chef of the clinic) made all the food that day for all these people, around 35 people. I have never seen such warm feelings between the doctors and the patients, it was something really special! Another thing that is not forgotten in the South of Italy is laughing! In Sweden and also in other parts of the world I think that we almost have stopped laughing or at least do not laugh very often. People in the South of Italy seem to live for talking, discussing and laughing and I really like it.

This was a small piece of my CIF-program in Italy and my thoughts about the first week of the CIF-program. After this, I went to do my practice in a social office in Padova, outside Venice for two weeks and ended up in Ljubliana in Slovenia for the last week of the CIF-program but that's another story.

Integrated Care Model for Seniors: Senior Health and Wellness Center - Learn about the first model care system of its kind in the U.S. where the care

### **Youth:**

Autism 101 - The incidence of Autism is increasing at an alarming rate. Explore the characteristics and challenges for individuals on the autism spectrum including common characteristics, sensory considerations, and communication issues.

Arts based programming: Motivations through Excellence - Understand how a nationally recognized arts based program provides personal development, promotes academic achievement, personal empowerment, and leadership skills to an underserved urban youth population.

Peer Mediation: Handling conflict resolution from the students' perspective - Peer mediation is both a program and a process where students facilitate resolving disputes between themselves. This process has proven effective in schools around the United States, changing the way students understand and resolve conflict in their lives.

### **Community Development**

Conflict Transformation: Seeing conflict as a positive force for change - Conflict is inevitable and is a natural occurrence in all human interaction, whether among co-workers, family members, or community residences. If handled poorly, conflict becomes a negative force that separates people, makes decision-making difficult, and undermines group effectiveness. This workshop promotes conflict as a resource and positive force for change.

## All alone in Athens

I spent 4 weeks in May 2006 as a participant in a CIF programme, which was located in Athens in Greece.

Since I love everything that has anything to do with Greece, and really like everything that I know about the Greek "lifestyle", I couldn't resist the

opportunity offered by the CIF exchange programme to come to Greece and Athens.

Normally in a CIF programme you are involved in a fixed programme along with other participants. This was not the case for me, because this year I was the only applicant for Greece. After a number of e-mails between CIF Hellas, and myself I was told that they were prepared to accept me and prepare a "special programme" on the basis that I would be the only participant.

I have visited Greece many times as a tourist. For many years, I have spent at least a few weeks each summer on one or more of the Greek islands. And as I said, I have really liked the Greece that I have encountered.

This time, I would have the opportunity to see another side of Greece. I would meet professionals in my own field and have the chance to make comparisons with my everyday work, and the problems and difficulties that Swedish social services are struggling with.

I have been working as a social worker for almost 25 years, the past ten of them as a manager responsible for a programme area. To tell the truth, as the years have passed I have increasingly doubted whether the "Swedish model" is always the best one. Social work in Sweden has very much become the exercise of a role as a public authority, with focus on interpretation of current legislation.

Back, to my stay in Greece. I spent the first few days at the Psychiatric Hospital of Attica with Pantelis, who looked after me with great warmth and commitment. I was told how the awful 1999 earthquake was the factor that initiated a wide-ranging psychiatric reform which gave many patients the chance to move out of hospitals and into housing.

The second week, I began my longer 3-week stay at the social work office in Iraklion of Attika. I took part in the everyday life of the social work office along with the social workers Eleni and Meropi. We have a lot of fun together and I have the opportunity to see the daily life for the social workers.

Conditions for social work really are different in Sweden and Greece. Greek municipal social workers spend most of their time providing information and supportive counselling, unlike Swedish municipal social work, which is mainly about investigating and making decisions about measures.

Greek municipal social work does not have the resources or wherewithal to offer individuals the type of support measures that we do in Sweden. Despite the lack of measures, my lasting impression was still that those who contacted the social workers were happy with the help they received. The help

and support were designed to help the individual and his or her network to take responsibility for changing their situation. In Sweden, the authorities are often expected to take this responsibility which many times create a false sense of security.

During these three weeks, I observed the everyday life of a Greek social worker at close range. For example, the day on which Meropi was "ordered" to act as secretary to the Mayor because the usual secretary had other things to do. I wonder what his view of social work was.

Or the visit to an elderly single woman with no relatives? The preparations for the blood donation campaign. The discussions of cases. The celebration of "name days", so different from the Swedish way to do, but so fun. And the visit to the Lavrion, a refugee camp.

The visit to the refugee camp is something I will remember particularly well. The social worker in charge was an unusually committed and warm-hearted person who really did the best for the refugees staying at the camp. These refugees were living in extremely meagre circumstances, and with so many personal tragedies and human fates gathered together in one and the same place, the air vibrated with tension. But the fact that these refugees were able to support themselves through work locally was, I think, a good thing and a contributing factor in what was a rather bearable existence despite extreme conditions.

I also spent a further few days at various activities that focused on drug abusers. Here, too, the work I saw was of very good quality and with very well trained staff.

Apart from seeing the social workers' everyday working life, I also got a very good insight into everyday life in Greece. I lived in central Athens with Mrs Imelda, who was a very active and sociable person with a wide circle of friends and who energetically enjoyed what Athens had to offer by way of cultural activities.

Most evenings, Mrs Imelda had an idea of what we could do but she always let me say no. Because she herself had participated in a CIF programme, she knew all about the fatigue you can suffer after a whole day of new impressions.

So, what did I think about being a "lone" participant in a CIF programme? Perfect,- as far as I am concerned. Perhaps I am a bit "anti-social", but it was enough for me to get all these impressions on my own. I think, too, that if I had been in a group with people from other countries to relate to, it could

easily have become a different kind of stay and perhaps not as "Greek" as I think it was.

I think that it is very important however, if they are receiving a lone participant, that committed "hosts" are available who will get involved and take the participant along in social contexts outside the professional placement.

I can only recommend that more people to take the chance that an exchange programme provides. It is a privilege to be given the opportunity to spend time in a country for a long period of time.
